We have made a few offers on houses but are struggling to be competitive in the real estate market. We are trying to be very frugal in our spending and to save as much as possible for a suitable deposit. Please keep this endeavour in your prayers.

Church



I have recently begun writing a weekly bulletin for the church. This includes a few ministry notices such as who's on cleaning that month, or who's organizing the Lord's Supper each week. It has details about the Bible classes we have available, contribution figures, what's on this week, order of service for the Sunday morning worship, and a prayer list for the brethren with ongoing prayer requests. This bulletin has received some very positive

feedback from the church, as they feel much more informed about what's going in the church, and they appreciate having a regularly updated prayer list.

One of my responsibilities at Gipps Street is to organize some assistance to some of the

smaller congregations around South-East Queensland that need a bit of help. Unfortunately, as I have been on the Sunday sermon for a majority of the first half of the year, I have not been able to do much of this. However, we were recently contacted by a church in Coffs Harbour, in North-East New South Wales, telling us about a camp they are hosting, and they needed more men to help lead singing and devotionals for the camp. As the camp was over the school holidays, and was over weekdays and not on a Sunday, I decided I would take the



opportunity to bring the family to a church camp. We all had a great time, and the girls loved the activities and crafts that they had on each day of the camp. We also had an opportunity to swim in the nearby lake, something that we are not able to do much in Toowoomba. The lake



is surrounded by paperbark trees which have discoloured the water with tea-tree oil. This means that swimming in the lake is less like swimming in water and feels more like swimming in sweet tea. While it is initially a little uncomfortable getting into water that colour, it is apparently very good for your skin. Before heading back home, we took a quick trip to the coast for an early lunch, where we got to see a proper surf beach for the first time in over 5 years. The girls liked watching as people tried to catch the waves and ended up getting swept under them.

Another church that recently reached out is the Windsor church of Christ in Sydney. They have recently lost one of their regular preachers and are about to be getting a full-time preacher in October this year. Trevor Tattersall, a fellow Tasmanian, just graduated from the Southeast Institute of Biblical Studies and will shortly be making his way back down to Australia to work with Windsor. Before Trevor arrives, the Windsor church have asked for some help in hosting a youth event to help get the youth motivated and involved in the church. In the winter school holidays (June/July), several of the members and youth of the church at Gipps Street will be taking a trip down to Sydney to assist with this event. I will be presenting one of the lessons focused on strengthening and motivating the youth of the church.

Back at Gipps Street, I have finished my sermon series through the book of Jeremiah, and we have begun a new series on the Sermon on the Mount, which will go for 16 weeks. Unlike previous series, in which Daniel would preach from the book Deuteronomy, and then I would take over and preach from the book of Jeremiah, Daniel

and I will be preaching on the Sermon on the Mount together. One of our focuses in working together is to present a cohesive and intentional approach to our preaching. To this end, Daniel and I spent some time studying Matthew 5-7 together to figure out how we were going to preach through the material. This was very helpful in ensuring that we both shared the same



views on the sermon and could present it cohesively to the church. Daniel began the series with The Beatitudes and Salt and Light, focusing on the theme of "Kingdom People." I will be picking up from here, and dealing with the rest of chapter 5, focusing on "Kingdom Living."

Outreach

I have been working on getting some material together to assist the church in reaching out to the community. The church here does not have a specified community outreach plan and has generally committed to doorknocking and letterboxing around specific events. I am trying to put something together to help with the regular and ongoing outreach of the church. I recall my time at the Karns church of Christ when they hosted Rob Whitacre's American Mission Campaign. In this, I saw a great deal of outreach resources and opportunities that I believe would be greatly applicable to work in Australia. While I have not yet implemented the strategies of the campaign, I have put together some greeting cards that include the churches information on the back. After our recent campaign in January, I have had a few of the members of the church write cards out to some of our contacts. However, I would like to also focus on writing cards to contacts made through the church members themselves and see how we can reach out to our community without the need for a campaign or an event.

I have recently organized some new visitor cards to take down the details of our visitors to the church. This has gone quite well and has resulted in a few outreach opportunities. Whenever we have a visitor, after I get their details, I like to establish contact the next day to thank them for their attendance and warmly invite them to attend again. This is usually done with a hand-written card and then followed up with a phone call later in the week. We have been greatly blessed by a few repeat visitors, one of whom will hopefully be studying with us in the near future.

I have recently been in contact with World Bible School about the use of their material. One of the leaders at WBS is going to be in Australia next month, so we are going to have him visit for an outreach seminar focusing on how we can use WBS material in our outreach. I am not particularly familiar with WBS material, so I am looking forward to hearing about it and how we can implement it into our evangelism plan.

The past few months have been very busy for our little family.


